BRATTLEBORO, VT—February 28, 2018—The public is invited to join **Peoples**, **Places**, **and the History of Words in Brattleboro, Vermont** (Brattleboro Words Project) for its second **Roundtable Discussion** on **Thursday**, **March 8, 2018** at **118** Elliot from **6–7** pm. This month, Leadership Team members **Rich Holschuh** (Vermont Commission for Native American Affairs) and **Joe Rivers** (Brattleboro Historical Society) will give a **presentation and lead a discussion** exploring indigenous **Abenaki** sites, experience, and use of their 12,000 year-old **Algonquian dialect** in the context of first contact with Europeans in the Brattleboro area, which they call **Wantastegok**. Roundtable participants are invited to share their knowledge of **Wantastegok**, Abenaki history, and Algonquian language and **enjoy native-inspired refreshments** during this **free program**.

The Brattleboro Words Project is a multi-year community research initiative backed by a National Endowment for the Humanities matching grant that works with schools and community members to produce walking, biking, and driving tours of the Brattleboro area, a book about Brattleboro's publishing and printing history, and exhibits celebrating our area's rich history of words. Each second-Thursday of the month, The Roundtable Discussion Series will present research and open a discussion on a different, "words-related" site in the Brattleboro area.
